

# BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Applied Law

## Course Details

Ever wanted to know how law gets made or the difference between the civil and criminal courts? Or how a snail changed the law of negligence? Then this course is for you!

The Extended Certificate in Applied Law is a fascinating course that aims to provide students with a coherent introduction to the legal sector. The course allows students to explore Law and the legal system through practical activities and by applying the law to scenarios. Students will study key aspects of the English legal system, how laws are made, and areas of criminal and civil law. Students will develop their interest for Law through seeing the legal system in action. As the course consists of a combination of continual assessment through written assignments, and external examinations, it is likely to appeal to anyone interested in studying Law, but who prefers a course with some coursework assignments rather than exams.

A variety of different methods will be used and this will vary for each topic. To enrich the course, students will visit the Law Courts and guest speakers will be invited in. Seeking work experience in a legal environment will be encouraged.

The course assumes that students will have not studied the subject before, however, they will need to be organised, have the ability to work independently and meet regular deadlines.

## **Module titles and codes:**

**Mandatory Units. The following units are compulsory and have to be studied by all students:**

### **Unit 1**

**Dispute solving in Civil Law – Externally assessed (Written examination – 1hr 30mins. 60 marks. Based on a pre-released case study).**

In this unit, students will explore how civil disputes are resolved, both in the courts and by alternative means. They will examine the making and working of precedent and its application in the law of negligence.

### **Unit 2**

**Investigating Aspects of Criminal Law and the Legal System – Internally assessed.**

In this unit, students will research how laws are made and interpreted, who advises and decides on the outcome of criminal cases and the punishments that can be imposed if laws are broken. They will then present advice to clients on non-fatal offence case studies.

### **Unit 3**

**Applying the law – Externally assessed (Written examination – 2hrs. 72 marks. Based on two pre-released cases).**

In this unit, students will examine the law related to specific crimes, including homicide and offences against property. They will explore the police procedures for dealing with such offences.
