

Christopher Whitehead Sixth Form Dress Code



Introduction

Christopher Whitehead Sixth Form is a professional environment and sixth form students are seen as role models for the whole school. As senior students in a school environment, all students are expected to dress smartly. The dress code which follows aims to ensure that sixth form students dress in a manner that is appropriate for a professional workplace, extremes of fashion will not be permitted.

The rationale of the dress code is:

- To provide a dress code that is acceptable and fair to everyone and appropriate in a school environment.
- To enable us to maintain positive relationships between staff and students and minimise conflict between parties, allowing staff to focus on the academic performance of the students.
- To provide a dress code which is inclusive and does not place unreasonable/ excessive costs on parents.
- To allow a degree of freedom and independence within a reasonable, mutually agreed framework.

The following guidelines are applicable to all students Tuesday to Friday:

Category	Smart/Casual
Trousers/ Skirts	<p>Smart, suitable for a professional work environment. Chinos, jeans and tracksuit bottoms can be worn, but must not be ripped.</p> <p>The following are not permitted:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Army trousers• Jogging bottoms / lounge wear (oversized / baggie in design)• Leggings or Jeggings worn as trousers <p>Leggings/ jeggings are allowed if worn beneath a longer top/ dress/ skirt.</p> <p>Skirts and shorts must be at least mid-thigh length.</p> <p>No underwear should be visible.</p>
Tops/ shirts	<p>Tops that expose the abdomen or chest are not permitted.</p> <p>No large/ obvious or offensive artwork or, logos or slogans are allowed.</p>
Jackets / jumpers/ cardigans/ hoodies	<p>No offensive artwork, logos or slogans are allowed.</p>
Shoes	<p>Shoes should be smart, and suitable for a professional work environment.</p> <p>Heels and fastenings must not be detrimental to student safety.</p>
Outdoor coats	<p>Outdoor coats should be removed when entering a learning environment.</p>
Hats and headwear	<p>Outdoor hats / caps should be removed when entering the learning environment.</p> <p>It is our expectation that a student's whole face should be visible in school.</p>
Sunglasses, headphones and phones	<p>Sunglasses should be removed when entering a building.</p> <p>Headphones and phones are permitted in the sixth form centre but must not be used around the school in accordance with the whole school policy.</p> <p>Phones may be used in lessons ONLY to support learning and at the agreement of the subject teacher.</p>

To support our students in feeling comfortable and confident for slightly more formal occasions we are introducing "Dress up Monday". Our rationale for introducing this concept is to encourage our students to choose to wear clothes that would be suitable to attend work experience placements, university, apprenticeship or employment interviews. These are activities that all students within our sixth form will participate in during the course of their studies. We wish to avoid students and parents having to go out and make one off purchases for these types of clothes for such events. Our intension is to ensure everyone gets sufficient wear out of the items they already have or have purchased. "Dress up Monday" does not require anyone to go out and buy suits, ties, shirts, but explore and wear clothes already in their wardrobes that look suitable for these more formal / professional occasions.

The following guidance times are applicable to all students on a Monday:

Category	Smart employment wear
Trousers / Skirts	<p>Smart, suitable for a formal occasion. Chinos, linen, cotton rich, corduroy.</p> <p>The following are not permitted:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Jeans • Tracksuit bottoms • Army trousers • Leggings or jeggings worn as trousers <p>Leggings/ jeggings are allowed if worn beneath a longer top/ dress/ skirt.</p> <p>Skirts and shorts must be at least mid-thigh length.</p>
Tops / Shirts	<p>Smart, suitable for a formal occasion. Shirts (short or long sleeve), blouses (e.g. sleeved popover style), polo shirts (no large artwork / offensive slogans), short or long sleeved cuff tops.</p>
Jackets / jumpers / cardigans	<p>No offensive artwork, logos or slogans are allowed</p> <p>The following item is not permitted:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hoodies
Shoes	<p>Shoes should be smart, and suitable for a professional work environment e.g. leather, material mix, patented, suede. Shoes or boots can be worn.</p> <p>Footwear must be safe and suitable for the school environment, therefore heels and fastenings must not be detrimental to student safety.</p> <p>The following are not permitted:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Trainers • Pumps • Canvas

Notes:

Due to constant changes in fashion, it remains the right of senior members of staff and the Head of Sixth Form to determine whether a student's personal appearance is appropriate for a school sixth form environment.

We endeavour to maintain a positive relationship between staff and students, and therefore politely request that all students adhere to this policy.
